





## Message from the lay minister

ell, Christmas has come and gone, the old year has gone, and the new one begun. Soon the season of Lent will begin. Then we look forward to Easter. As I look back on these events, particularly Christmas, it is the start of a chain of events that began way before the birth of Jesus.

God wanted to test Abraham to see just how far he would go in serving him. So God asked Abraham to sacrifice his only son Isaac to the Lord. Abraham would have done it too, albeit with a broken heart. God stopped him and promised Abraham that God himself would provide the sacrifice.

Christmas is the beginning of that promise. I am reminded of words we use regularly in church: "God so loved the world that he gave his only son to save us from our sins and to be our advocate in heaven." So Jesus' birth at Christmas is the manifestation of God's love for the world and which would lead ultimately to his sacrifice for us on the Cross.

Love is quite a popular thing that we celebrate in February. I refer of course to Valentine's Day. A registrar friend of mine told me that it is the busiest time of the year for them performing marriage ceremonies. So how does Valentine's Day become synonymous with love? It should be correctly called Saint Valentine's Day, but in these days of pure

Commercialism, the Saint bit has been conveniently dropped.

On February 14th, not one but two St Valentines are celebrated. One, a former priest martyred on the Flaminian Way circa 269AD, and the other a Bishop of Terni, who was martyred in Rome.

So there is no connection between these two saints and love and courtship. More likely is the association with the pagan festival of Lupercalia which takes place in mid-February. This celebrates the Roman god Lupercal, god of fertility and flocks.

Quite amazingly, Valentine's Day this year coincides with Ash Wednesday, the start of Lent. Each Ash Wednesday we have a service in the evening where to mark the start of Lent and to signify our penance, the priest marks our foreheads with the sign of the cross in ash. Jeremy joked that perhaps he should mark our foreheads with a heart instead of a cross!

Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day do not seem to sit nicely together, but they do. Lent starts us on the road towards Easter, and the ultimate example of love. Jesus gave his life for us on the cross, the promise God made to Abraham is completed. Then, to prove that love does in deed conquer all, Jesus rises again from the dead to give us new life. So it really is all about love, the love God has for us through Jesus Christ.

Perhaps on Ash Wednesday we should have a heart marked on our foreheads after all!



## Vodafone appeal successful

Vodafone have won their appeal to site a radio mast opposite the Swan pub in Swineford to improve coverage in the local area.

South Gloucestershire Council had objected to the phone giant seeking prior approval for a 17.5m monopole, two microwave dishes and two equipment cabinets, saying it would harm the Green Belt. Locals and parish councillors shared the Green Belt concerns, as well as being worried about potential health risks, the effect on wildlife and flooding, and the implications for road safety and aircraft as there is an airstrip at Saltford.

However, the planning inspector felt the harm that would arise to the character and appearance of the area would be "modest", and said the appellant had provided a certificate to confirm that the proposal has been designed to comply with guidelines from the International Commission on Non-Ionizing Radiation Protection.

The inspector did not have evidence that the airstrip near Saltford falls within the definition of an aerodrome for the purposes of prior approval, or that the site is in a safeguarding zone; and said there was no evidence that the plans would worsen the flood risk to any significant extent. The appeal also found that as the site is set well back from the road, the mast wouldn't interfere with visibility. Concerns that bats may be affected were dismissed as there was no credible evidence.

# Power plant plan generates opposition

s some of you may know by now, plans have been submitted to South Gloucestershire Council to build a gas-fuelled power plant in a field off Beach Lane.



People from Beach, as well as in Bitton and Upton Cheyney, have

been writing to the council with their concerns, and the deadline for comments is 5th February.

Conrad Energy has submitted the application for a peaking gas generation plant off Beach Lane. The company would develop the land but does not own the right to connect to the National Grid. This is owned by Devon Power Developments, which have engaged Renplan to submit the application on Conrad's behalf.

A building in the field, *pictured above*, would house two 2MW generators, and there would be a liquefied natural gas (LNG) store, along with associated equipment. The site would be surrounded by a three-metre high security fence and a new access would be required to install the power plant and for the delivery of LNG refills three or four times a week.

The gas generators would operate for about 1,200 hours a year and power would feed into the electricity substation at Warmley. The plant would be for a temporary period of 25 years and the applicants say any "minor impacts" to the landscape would be "entirely reversible". They have also produced reports which show air quality impacts would be "minor", that noise generated would be below local background noise, and say there would be no adverse impact on local listed buildings.

They contend that the development meets the needs of local, regional and national priorities, therefore very special circumstances exist to justify development in the Green Belt. The site is also in the Cotswolds Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty but they claim that dozens of similar schemes will be needed in due course across this designated area.

Rob Deverell, of Uplands Farm, is acting as a spokesperson for people in Beach, and says the submission makes no mention of the fact that the hamlet is a conservation area, nor of the need to install high voltage connectors back to the substation.

Rob says the plans fail to adequately justify why Green Belt agricultural land within a conservation area and AONB should be used to house a gas-powered electricity generating plant in an area with no natural gas, and takes issue with the findings about noise, pollution and the impact on listed buildings.

He says the narrow lanes of the Golden Valley, which are well-used by horse riders and walkers, are unsuitable for the three to four journeys that would be required every week to deliver LNG by tanker, and that access to the field would be close to a blind bend.

Others share his concerns in comments posted on the council's planning portal, and, it is pointed out that work is starting this month (19th February) on the long-awaited introduction of a 30mph limit on the largely derestricted network of narrow lanes around the Golden Valley.

They say a recent incident in which a lorry went into a ditch in Upton Cheyney, *right*, highlights the roads are unsuitable for heavy vehicles.

There are fears voiced about horses being spooked by heavy vehicles, as well as from the noise of the plant's engines starting up. The effect on wildlife and the proximity of the (Continued overleaf)

Briarlands Guide camp are highlighted, and that the proposed the proposed entrance would involve removing trees and bushes, and diverting the stream underground.

Another resident comments that the only reason the plant has been proposed for this area is that it is close to a substation with capacity to receive electricity: "This is three miles away. A three-mile radius from this substation equates to 28.26 square miles. It is extremely likely that a more suitable industrial site could be found within this area. Despite the unsuitability of the land in question, I believe the substantial returns made on investment in such a development... has led the absentee landowner to take a chance on the successful outcome of this application with no regard to the land, its surroundings or neighbourhood."

The planning reference number is PK17/5762/F.

hirley Hodgson's talk last month about the vagrant children of Bristol was enthralling, but at the same time disconcerting, writes Mike Gates.

How could we have accepted that so many children could be abandoned and left to feed and clothe themselves? Shirley explained how those who ran the 'ragged schools' and industrial schools had, as evidenced from her research, tried valiantly to do their best for these children.

I can certainly recommend her latest book 'Bristol's Pauper Children', in which she provides a lot more detail about the efforts to educate and accommodate the vagrant children.

She also covers how she identified about 1,500 children who were sent to Canada and inevitably ended up with lives of drudgery, being used as farm workers or domestic servants and with no means to contact their families.

Thank you, Shirley, for such a well-presented, and absorbing talk, and Oldland Common United Reformed Church for hosting us so well.
