

Message from the Assistant Curate

s I type this article, I am reminded that spring is on its way - slowly but surely, *writes Anika Gardner*. If you are out and about you might have seen snowdrops, crocuses and other flowers. Yes, it has been a bit bleak, wet and cold - but spring is coming.

While technically spring doesn't start until later on in March, I think it is fair to welcome spring early.

A couple of years ago, British Gas

commissioned a survey about spring cleaning.

On average, house-proud Britons will spend 11 hours scrubbing, mopping and vacuuming their homes in time for spring. Around 70% of people will have an intensive tidy-up at the beginning of March - good news if you want to burn some calories: a deep clean burns 660 calories.

Householders will spend an average of 42 minutes vacuuming burning 136 calories (don't be too excited about that - that is only about three chocolate biscuits).

The annual spring clean is a tradition which has been around for centuries. And some researchers have traced potential origins to the Jewish practice of thoroughly cleaning the home in preparation for Passover, the celebration of the Israelites' liberation from slavery and their Exodus from Egypt. Feel free to do some more research and let me know what you find out.

As well as giving our home a good clean and maybe declutter it, it is also a good time to have a look at our personal lives and see if anything needs decluttering or a deep clean. And you might be right in the middle of it as some people decide that Lent is a good time to re-focus, look at our spiritual well-being and tidy up our lives a bit, ready for Easter.

If you are already doing that, great - keep going. If not, maybe you could think about a spring clean. This could be looking at internal aspects, do a spiritual health check ,i.e. reading the Bible, praying, etc., or it could be and actual decluttering in order to help us focus.

I am reminded of the parable in Luke 12:31-21 where a rich farmer has run out of room for all his crops. So he tears down his barns in order to build bigger ones, to store in all his grain and goods. Verse 21 is a harsh warning about storing up treasure for ourselves and not being rich towards God. It also reminds me of Matthew 6:21 which is part of the Gospel reading for Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent: *Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.*

It is so easy to get sucked into the cycle of storing up things. We live in a society that bombards us constantly with the message that we need more, more of this and that. Consumerism is everywhere. It shapes the way we eat, shop, rest, think, love and believe. We can't escape it. The popular belief is that life should be lived to the max; by contrast, Jesus modelled a life of joyful limitation: free to do and free not to do. Joy in enough.

A couple of years ago, I read the book 'Consumer Detox' by Mark Powley and I might read it again this year. It is a really good but challenging read about all the stuff in our lives and *(Continued overleaf)* encouraging us to look at a healthy rhythm of life, not being sucked into the consumer cycle and in turn living our lives more intentionally. (You can borrow this book if you'd like to).

Towards the end of that book is a poem that I would like to share with you all.

The Promise of Life

Because life is a gift, we live thankfully, Savour what we have, Pray for what we need. No longer hurried, distracted, or worried, We'll walk through each moment with God. Because everything is a gift, we live with open hands, Tread lightly on the earth, Share freely our homes and our things. No longer restlessly chasing identity, We'll be known by our love, not our logos. Because giving is a gift, we live generously, Give ourselves deeply to family and community, Give joyfully to those in need. No longer caught in the consumer dream, We'll invest in the kingdom of love.

e will be busy during Lent with Lent groups around the parish, with filling the Jar of Change in church for WaterAid, and starting the churchyard tidying and clearing on Saturday 3rd March at 10am.

Mothering Sunday is on 11th March, when we have the Scout Parade and Family Service, and we will be able to celebrate mothers and carers and give flowers. After the service the Scouts will be selling cakes for Scout funds.

Palm Sunday, 25th March, will be especially busy. There is Family Café Church at 9.30am with bacon sandwiches and fresh fruit breakfasts, when the Palm Sunday story will be told informally with crafts and games. Then at 10.30am there will be

Palm Sunday Praise, a short service with the traditional hymns which we all associate with the day. Sorry to have two services but we couldn't think of a way to combine the different forms so we look forward to seeing you at one or the other or both.



It is so easy to skip from Palm Sunday to Easter Day and not to think and ponder upon the sorrowful events between. The Maundy Thursday evening service, which tells of the events of the Last Supper, will take place in St Mary's on 29th March at 7.30pm and on Good Friday (30th March), we commemorate the last hour of Jesus' suffering on the Cross at 2pm.

On Easter Sunday, 1st April, there will be an early Communion service at 8am to welcome the day, and at 10.30am an Easter Celebration Communion Service will be followed by an Easter egg hunt in the churchyard. We are aiming to avoid this being too lengthy a service so that families can enjoy it together. The space at the back of the church gives us much more room for Family Café Church and also baptism services. We all really enjoyed the Burns Supper which saw 70 people seated at tables with tartan decorations and yielded a welcome £660 for church funds. At the time of writing we are looking forward to the jazz concert which will be another new experience.

Fred Gumisiriza: a lay reader in Uganda

ne of the things the Deanery Uganda Link Committee does is to support training for a lay reader in each of our three Link Dioceses. Many parishes rely wholly on a lay reader for ministry, and readers commonly have more than one large parish to serve, and maybe only a bicycle for travel.

In autumn 2017, we received an account from Fred Gumisiriza about life as a lay reader in Ruwenzori Diocese, Uganda.

Here are some of the issues he raises. Please pray!

• Poverty – lay readers often lack money to buy essentials for their families, and have no savings to cope with emergencies, such as sickness. Although they should receive payment from the Church, in practice they receive perhaps a quarter of the income they should.

• Lay readers really want to serve God better. Training and education is the key to this. Pray for more educational opportunities, and that lay readers will be able to be released from their Church duties and family responsibilities to attend.

• Energy for travel and to attend meetings, conduct services, do pastoral visiting and preach the Good News.

• Somewhere to stay, and food, etc. when away from home working in different areas of large parishes

• Success in income generation and diversification projects to reduce reliance on subsistence agriculture for both lay readers and the whole population.

• Homes in which lay readers and their families can live.

Praise God for the commitment and joyful self-sacrifice demonstrated by Fred and all lay readers. Fred says that he is inspired by Jesus, the great teacher who faced the same hardships. He speaks of God as his "helper, provider, doctor, adviser, teacher and even comfort so that I am never too tired to serve Him".

Fred and others are totally committed to preaching the Gospel because that is what they are called to do, and they refuse to be discouraged or prevented by tiredness.

My thanks to the churches of our benefice for their annual support of Fred and many others in Uganda through the Link.

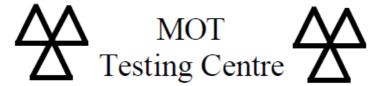
