

## Message from the minister

ecently I heard an item on the news about the work of clearing up floating islands of plastic in the Pacific Ocean, and a few hours later I conducted a wedding at which we sang All things Bright and Beautiful. As we sang, I could easily imagine God looking down and saying: "What on earth are you doing to my world?"

We produce two million tons of rubbish per day; every year half a billion tons of oil are accidentally spilled, and every year six million tons of refuse - some toxic or non-biodegradable - end up in the oceans. (1)

When God made the world He saw that it was 'very good' (Gen 1:v31), and as part of that world we were created, made in His image from the very dust of Creation - (Adam comes from 'Adamah', which means 'made from the ground'). So right from the beginning, the material and the spiritual came together, and a bond was forged between God, humanity and Creation; and God delights in this relationship. He invites us to share with Him the beauty of the natural world and to fully realise the joy of being human, of being made in His likeness, so at the heart of our spirituality should be the acknowledgement that the world belongs to God, not to us - we are simply a part of the created order, albeit with a special role to play.

When He made the world, God didn't set it going and then just leave it to its own devices, and He didn't turn His back on humanity when sin and disobedience came into the world. In fact He 'so loved the world' (Jn 3:v16) that He broke into it through Jesus to redeem not just humanity, but 'to reconcile to himself **ALL THINGS**, whether things on earth or things in heaven, by making peace through his blood shed on the cross'. (Col 1:v20.) So our spirituality needs to reflect God's delight in what He has made through our care of it, because He will redeem and transform it though Jesus Christ.

The Gospel that we are called upon to preach is somewhat diminished if we consider it to be for humanity alone. As Tom Wright says, "God will redeem the whole universe; Jesus' resurrection is the beginning of that new life, the fresh grass growing through the concrete of corruption and decay in the old world." (2)

What God desires for His world is 'shalom'- wholeness and wellbeing. Interdependence on the natural world is woven right through the story of God's people. Most of Jesus' teaching was done in the open, and many parables drew on images of the land and its resources - there was an intimate connection to the natural world that has been lost in today's post-modern society. Our role as disciples is to re-establish that connection, to live lives that reflect God's desire for 'shalom' and harmony across the whole of the natural world to live in ways that not only do not disadvantage other parts of creation, but which actually work for, and even enhance them. We are building for the future, for the renewed Kingdom, and our discipleship should embody "every act of love, gratitude and kindness, every work of art inspired by the love of God and inspired by the beauty of his creation, every act of care and nurture" that "embodies holiness and makes the name of Jesus honoured in the world". (3)

Let me leave you with two quotes: "Jesus teaches us to pray that God's will be done on earth as it is in heaven. The thought that life on earth among all God's creatures might *(see overleaf)*  reflect the harmonious relationships within heaven is the greatest inspiration for Christians. I have come to see that the future of the earth is central to the mission of God." (Bishop James Jones.)

"No generation has a freehold on this earth. All we have is a life tenancy with a full repairing lease." *(Margaret Thatcher.)* Shalom!



After lunch we took a tour of the gardens by Capability Brown with a walk alongside the lake to the ruins of the old castle and sat on the seat that Sir Walter Raleigh sat on to watch his new castle being built before his imprisonment for treason. The castle was returned to the crown and in 1617, Sir John Rigby acquired it. In 1620 he added the four distinctive wings to the house which was further extended in 1787.

Our president Ann Coles started our meeting by thanking everyone for their help at the Bitton Fete and saying how they enjoyed last month's outing to Barrington Court. After telling us of forthcoming events, she introduced speaker Jan Plenty who worked as a children's nurse for 40 years before crafting full time. She handed out cards and envelopes which she made earlier and we had to decorate them.

## Nature watch

Inet earth provides our food, our clean water and the air we breathe into our bodies, creating our energy and our lives. When nature suffers, we all suffer. And the bees, the multitude of bumblebees I see swarming over the lavender flowers each summer are a vital and intricate part of our world.

Interestingly the individual bees we see collecting nectar and pollen are unable to survive without being a member of a larger colony of bees. In a colony of honey bees each bee has its own role in the whole and they change their role as they mature. Starting out as house bees keeping the larvae clean and fed, they may then keep the hive cool in hot summers by fanning their wings to provide air conditioning or cluster around the queen to keep her and themselves warm when the temperature is icy cold.

When more mature, they move on to collecting nectar and pollen and also defending the hive entrance against intruders - wasps were especially aggressive this summer and have destroyed one of my hives.

So what we see as an individual bee collecting pollen is an illusion, the whole colony works together as one organism with the queen as its vital centre.

I was surprised to read in 'Guide to Bees of Britain' that there are more than 250 species of bee in the British Isles. Bees use pheromones to communicate with each other, a chemical odour of which scientists are discovering many variations. We humans are normally unaware of these odours as we cannot detect them with our everyday senses. Communication through sharing pheromones enables the colony to work together as a whole, passing on information between individual bees - the house bees may need to ask the flying bees to collect more nectar or pollen to feed the young

larvae; It is through sharing pheromones that all the bees in the hive know their queen is alive and well in the centre of their colony.

The main difference between bumblebees and honey bees is in the colony's life span. Honey bee colonies go on from one year to the next, using their honey stores



to get them through the cold winter when they are unable to fly and collect nectar.

Bumblebee colonies die out at the end of summer with only the newly fertilised young queen surviving, hibernating somewhere safe and warm until spring. When early spring arrives and she emerges from her hibernation, she will first feed herself on early flowers to regain her strength. Then she searches out a new home, possibly a disused mouse hole or a large tuft of grass, to create her nest. Once she has found a suitable home she goes on to collect pollen and nectar which she stores in little wax pots she has newly created. Thus she slowly builds a nursery where she can lay her eggs and rear her young.

So the huge early bumblebees you see in spring are the queens and her smaller companions are her early brood. The various colour markings define the type of bee and their size denotes how well or otherwise they were fed as young larvae. The buzz on the lavender brings such joy to our world and these are the same bumblebees I see pollinating my runner beans and tomato plants. Our lives are dependent on the world in which we live and the very hot weather worldwide this summer brings this home to us all.

So thank you bees, we need your presence to give variety and abundance to our food. And thank you nature for providing us with a beautiful world in which to live.

A public meeting has been called for Wednesday 10th October to discuss ongoing concerns with the volume and speed of traffic using the lanes around the Golden Valley.

The meeting, which has been called by villagers in Upton Cheyney and Beach, will be at the chapel in Wick Lane, Upton Cheyney, and local councillor Erica Williams is due to attend.

Many residents campaigned for years for a reduced speed limit in the largely derestricted lanes between the A420, Bath Road at Wick, the A4175 though Oldland Common and the A431 through Bitton, and earlier this year a 30mph limit was introduced.

However, some feel the reduced limit has only helped a bit and that further traffic calming measures are needed, with some calling for the speed limit to be lowered still further to 20mph in the residential areas.

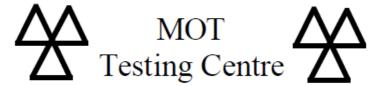
