

### Message from the minister

t was a cold November morning and a storm was brewing from the east, a fitting metaphor for a visit to someone who has vivid memories of the Second World War. I knocked on the door of a modest little cottage in a village nestling in the Gloucestershire countryside. I had arranged to meet a veteran of the war to get some secondhand experience and stories for a university essay; I forget the title now, but something to do with a 'Theology of Remembrance Sunday' and attempting to explore "what was going on in the minds of those who gather around the war memorials of the country, and what they thought they were doing".

I was meeting an ex-RAF bomber pilot who, in spite of his exemplary service (he received the Distinguished Flying Medal) was, like his cottage, rather more modest. "We were only doing what was expected of us... getting on with the job in hand... because the alternative for our country was unthinkable," he said as he told his story of the war years. There were many of them too: humorous, serious and profound reflections on man's inhumanity to man, about comradeship, about physical and mental survival and of course, memories of those lost being promoted to squadron leader after two weeks on the squadron simply because of the loss rate of aircraft and crews.

"What are we doing on Remembrance Sunday?" I asked, and

it was certainly clear what this pilot had been doing over the years, remembering his comrades, reflecting on the necessity of war and its futility. There was no triumph in his answer, no pride in himself, only a pride in sharing life in extremis with those who didn't make it home. And then he said it: "When we are gone, we should stop doing this. When there is no one left who remembers those days, we should stop remembrance and assign this war to the history books and get on with the future we fought the war for."

Two things struck me. The first was that in spite of all his experiences of war, he was still hopeful. Certainly, hope is a theological virtue that the Church should work hard at recovering, and to be hopeful in life is to put your trust in something bigger, wider and deeper than ourselves. For the Church, our hope rests in the salvation bought by Jesus Christ himself that has given us an eternal future. This pilot was hopeful that all that was sacrificed, all that was done, all that was achieved in war had given us a future, a freedom and a new beginning. He was certainly hopeful for his grandchildren and great grandchildren.

The second thing that struck me was that whilst he could tell of his reflections on Remembrance Day of the war that he fought in and the people close to him that he lost, this was not the only thing going on. Indeed, each generation discovers their own wars and lessons from wars. We are slow to learn the lesson, quick to violence and slow to make peace.

This is why we gather on Remembrance Day, for these two reasons: to live in hope because we remember why there is still a future, and to spare a thought for those who continue to put themselves in harm's way in the pursuit of peace. May this centenary year help us to remember to live hopefully and continue to work for peace.



### **Bitton WI report**

e attended the federation annual meeting at Weston-super Mare in the newly refurbished Winter Gardens. The first speaker was Graham Dynes, from Hearing Dogs for Deaf People, with one of the dogs. He told us how they were trained and who would benefit from one.

The guest speaker in the afternoon was Eleanor Stewart who gave a fascinating talk on her life as a nun and midwife. She was entertaining and has written several books.

At the end of September we attended the Kings Chase group's autumn meeting at Fisher Road in Kingswood. We were welcomed by June Thorne, who told us that she had been let down by the demonstrator at 9.30 that morning, too late for a replacement, so she stepped in and did three beautiful flower arrangements which were entered into the raffle. A delicious tea was then served.

Our monthly meeting started as usual with announcements and forthcoming events, then our president Ann Coales introduced the speaker David Gray, head gardener at Edington Priory estate. He has won gold medals at RHS shows and is a judge on the trade stands.

His talk was about growing in containers. You can grow almost anything in pots and he brought lots to show us. He explained that metal pots are not good as they are hot in the summer, burning the roots, and cold in winter, but they can be lined with polystyrene and it is important to have feet to circulate air.

The next meeting will be on Monday 12th November which will be our annual meeting with entertainment. The flower club topic on Tuesday 20th will be a Christmas decoration.

### Major concerns over traffic

With many locals already very worried about the volume and speed of traffic using the lanes in and around the Golden Valley, B&NES Council's plans to establish a clean air zone for central Bath have raised concerns about the implications for our area.

There is currently a public consultation into the proposed CAZ which would involve motorists paying £9 to drive in the city if their vehicles do not meet low emissions criteria.

It is due to come into effect in late 2020 and the western edge will be set at Royal Victoria Park on the Upper Bristol Road and just beyond Oldfield Park on Lower Bristol Road.

Concerns were raised at the recent Community Engagement Forum held in Bitton that the plans will see a rise in the number of vehicles using the lanes and A431 and crossing the river at Newbridge to avoid paying the charge.

The consultation is open until 26<sup>th</sup> November and you will have received details through the post about how to have your say.

We'll have more on local traffic concerns next month.

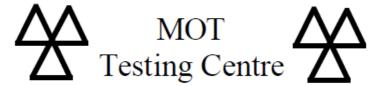
