The Last Word—First

A Toast to Her Majesty

here has never before been a Platinum Jubilee for a reigning monarch. Both King George III and Queen Victoria marked fifty years on the throne and Victoria, sixty, in 1897. But Queen Elizabeth II has created her own record as the longest serving and oldest monarch in Britain's history. This year's celebrations also mean that in the 21st century, less than a quarter gone, we have already had more such royal jubilees than the whole of the 20th century that hosted only two.

Forty five years ago, the first of the Queen's jubilees marked her first 25 years. It was a different time. verv The Sex Pistols produced a roval special with "God save the Queen the Fascist Regime" and the country prepared for the occasion, at first. slightly nonchalantly. The 1960s and 70s had seen an ebbing

social deference and challenge to institutions; there was some concern about the degree to which the public would embrace the occasion. Yet, as the celebrations mounted and as she undertook the first walkabouts, it was clear, that there remained a surprisingly deep affection for the Queen herself. It is an affection that seems to have waned little in successive years, despite many challenges.

In her life the Queen made two public vows. At her coronation she made a vow to rule the people of her then extensive Commonwealth with law and justice and maintain the laws of God. But she had also made another, more personal vow on her 21st birthday. On that occasion it was a promise that her "whole life, whether it be short or long will be dedicated to your service." Would anyone, whatever they may feel about the institution of monarchy, deny that in her very long life she has not adhered to these undertakings?

As we raise a toast to Her Majesty on the Jubilee weekend, let us do so with affection, but with admiration too, for someone who, has remained constant and has done what she has promised in a changing world.

The toast is: "The Queen."



Lay Minister's Letter—Leslie Wilcox

Pentecost and the abiding presence of God

In the early days of the Exodus when God, through Moses, had released the Israelites from slavery in Egypt the journey to the promised land was tough. The daily diet of manna was meagre and the nomadic existence as starkly different from their settled if oppressed life in Egypt. The nation grumbled; how they grumbled. Moses faced criticism and rebellion from the people but really it was God they moaned about.

When Moses was high up Mount Sinai receiving the Ten Commandments, the nation at the foot of the mountain was building a golden calf as an idol to worship. This and their constant grumbling angered God to the extent that he threatened to leave the Israelites to make their own way to the promised land. 'The people are too obstinate and they make me angry and I would consume them if I go with them,' God told Moses.

The threat of being abandoned in the middle of the wilderness filled the people with dread. They asked Moses to plead on their behalf and God relented. He accompanied them on their journey, his presence signified by a cloud during the day and fire at night.

The need to be aware of God's presence was integral to the faith and security of the nation. The psalms reflect the gamut of the feelings that they had, sometimes feeling close and reassured (Psalm 23) sometimes longing for his presence (Psalm 42) sometimes feeling abandoned (Psalm 22).



Down the ages people have longed to know the presence of God to bring reassurance, confidence, purpose and blessing to their lives. Life can leave us bemused, battered and damaged. Our everyday experiences are not all sweetness and light. No matter what our situation is, some days are more challenging than others. Often there are sustained periods when we feel that life is getting the better of us.


Jesus sought to reassure his disciples of his abiding presence with them. Time after time during that last meal he shared with them he sought to encourage them with comforting words; 'Do not let your hearts be troubled, trust God and trust me', 'I will ask the Father and he will give you another advocate to be with you for ever', 'I will not leave you orphaned'. (In John's gospel, chapters 14 - 17 if you look you can find more).

That reassurance of his presence and the giving of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost (Acts chapter 2) are the promise and fulfilment of his abiding presence to all who have faith in him. We can know his presence daily because he has promised and will keep his promise.

By the time you read this the day of Pentecost, when we remember the fulfilment of his promises, will probably have passed, clouded and squeezed out by the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations. But you can be renewed and refreshed by asking God to bless you with his Spirit's presence every day and always.

If you have any plants that you could donate to the plant sale, we would love to have them. Please can you clearly label them with the plant name and bring them along to Church Farm in the morning.






Henry Nicholson Ellacombe (1822-1916), the second vicar with that name, lived until he was nearly 94. Yet one still might ask how he fitted so much into just one lifetime? It was a life that comprised church, community, horticulture and travel, all of which he undertook with gusto and, what is more, left behind so many souvenirs and memorabilia. It is part of what he left behind that forms the core of the display.

The exhibition was opened on 21 May by Stephanie Cole following an address by Nick Wray, the Director of the University of Bristol Botanic Garden.

125 years ago this month another jubilee was being celebrated with a special fête near Fieldgrove Lane. Ellacombe placed this poster in his scrapbook.



Nick spoke of Ellacombe's understanding of the soil and the beneficial position of the vicarage garden with its rich solid and sheltered climate. At a time when Britain's empire was drawing in new plants from all over the world, Ellacombe was keen to try and grow them himself, frequently with great success. But the key lesson that both he and his father taught was that of giving and swapping plants, and that if you wanted one of the new plants to survive and to thrive you share it by giving a plant to someone else. There are records in the display showing how many plants Ellacombe was exchanging with friends but particularly with Kew Gardens.

Stephanie Cole was pleased to regale us with tales of her past. A keen bellringer she would sit in the rear pew with one of her friends (also a bellringer) between services, playing cards She also told an extraordinary tale (known already to some) about dangling a bicycle from the bell tower. Those attending the opening event received some delicious refreshments and were entertained by appropriate music by the St Mary's Minstrels. We were also pleased to be joined on the occasion by Canon Ellacombe's great grandson, Gilbert and his wife, Felicity, and by members of the Cockey family, descendants of Canon Ellacombe's daughter, who married the then Vicar of Oldland, Herbert Cockey.



Ellacombes archives, however, cover more than just gardening. He kept many other items and records of events and activities in Bitton's life during his times. Many of these are also on show and will be in the chapel at St Mary's until the Fête this September.

The opening event was well attended. Refreshments were served and music from the Victorian era was played. What would Ellacombe have thought of it?

DAC Approval for Phase Two

Proposals for works inside St Mary's have now been recommended for approval by the Diocesan Advisory Committee, meaning that they have passed the next stage and must now be subject to formal public consultation including a number of historic advisory societies. Members of the DAC visited the church in April to review the plans and the committee now intends to recommend to the Consistory Court that a faculty should be issued subject to formal consultation.

The approval is only for works within the church. The three principal items are the installation of a new floor in English limestone; reworking the pews to make them more comfortable and mobile (so that they can be positioned as needed); and, to clean the walls. More detailed proposals will be on display in St Mary's during the month of June.

The full cost of the project has not been estimated and rising costs are likely to mean that a significant inflation contingency will be

needed. Donations toward the project are now being sought and for those who like the idea of knowing where their money is spent, there is now the opportunity to either sponsor a pew (£1000) or sponsor a paving stone (£250). There will be 22 pews retained and it is estimated that there is about 500 square metres of floor space to be covered, so there is every opportunity. Two pews already have sponsors!

The consultation period runs for 30 days from 30 May.



While cash is still welcome, the cashless society has clearly arrived for most and a card or phone has become the normal way to pay for most of us.

To aid donations for the development fund a Donation Station has ben installed solely for the Development Appeal and, for this summer, will be located close to the Ellacombe exhibition. The box connects to a card reader and the church Wi-Fi, allowing instant payments to be made. The Development Appeal is separate from other church funds so that people who would not normally give to the church can be sure that their money is going towards the development programme only.

Those wishing to donate for the work of the church can still give gifts through the vestry door or by use of the other card reader on the desk inside the west door.

News from Bitton WI

Our monthly meeting took place on 9 May 2022. What a lovely sunny day it was too, reminding us that summer is just around the corner. For WI members it also means lots of things to do and places to visit with our WI friends. Following a warm welcome from our President and a reminder of the forthcoming National WI AGM, our Delegate attending the meeting outlined the Resolution put forward nationally that we would need vote upon. This resolution calls upon our Government to look at Women and Girls with ASD & ADHD – Identified, Under-diagnosed, Misdiagnosed and under supported. She reported that for a number of reasons, women and girls with ASD or ADHD are often overlooked as traditionally it has always been thought that this relates mainly to men and boys. Symptoms in women and girls are often less noticeable or they work hard to mask them. The group voted unanimously to support this Resolution.

Our President, Jean, and Sylvia once again told us about the many and varied outings still available to sign up to. We are all eagerly looking forward to our Summer Jubilee Party which will take place on Monday 20 June. There will also be a Rose in a jam jar competition (from your own garden – not the local supermarket!). Watch this space for news on our outings and who won the competition.

Our speaker this month was Sandie Bateman who gave a delightful insight into how The Minack Theatre came into being and her time acting in productions there from 1985 – 2004. She told us about Rowena Cade who moved to Cornwall with her mother after her father died and purchased some land near Porthcurno for just £100. There she had a house built and over the years would sew costumes for her local drama group. In 1931 the group wanted to stage The Tempest but their inland theatre didn't seem the right place to do it. Rowena offered her garden, knowing that the backdrop of the rugged Cornish coastline would be perfect. She and two local builders set about building a small stage on the cliff edge. The Tempest was staged there in the summer of 1932 and was a roaring success, gaining recognition nationally. The Minack Theatre was

born — an unusual amphitheatre exposed to all the Cornish weather and sea could throw at it. Over the years Rowena herself worked with her builder to improve the Theatre, using local granite and sand from the beach below to mix with the cement to make the seating, pillars, pathways and carparks. It was a labour of love and she never stopped working on improving the theatre until her death in 1983 aged 90 yrs. The Minack was given Charitable Trust status in 1976 and performances can still be seen there to this day.

Sandie told us how she had always wanted to act but her family hoped for better for her so she studied to be a teacher. She had always attended a stage school locally and really enjoyed acting but was unable to take part in performances away from home due to her work commitments. The owner of her dance school had already become firm friends with Rowena Cade and many productions had been performed at The Minack by her group. In 1985 Sandie was able to fulfil her ambition to act at The Minack and fell in love with the theatre. She performed in many productions until 2004.

The Minack is a very unusual place and you have to see it to believe it. I was amazed by it when we visited just before lockdown. I'd thoroughly recommend a visit if you are in the area.

Before my recipe, another reminder to anyone thinking of coming along to join us. We'd love to see you. Our next meeting is Monday 13 June at 2 pm, Bitton Church Hall where we will be introduced to the delights of Chair Zumba!

My recipe this month is a variation on a favourite of mine. My family love spiced apple cake, but having a glut of rhubarb this year, I thought I'd give

this a go. The result was delicious. Great on it's own and super special with lashings of hot creamy custard!

Summer Rhubarb Cake (WI Recipe)

Ingredients

225g butter or margarine

225g caster sugar

225g self raising flour

3 large eggs

Tsp or few drops of vanilla essence/extract

300g rhubarb, diced

1 tbsp demerara or icing sugar to dust

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C/gas mark 4. Grease a 23cm square cake tin and line bottom with baking parchment.
- 2. Wash and prepare the Rhubarb cutting in small diced pieces.
- 3. In a large mixing bowl add the butter, sugar, flour, eggs and vanilla essence/extract and beat together until smooth and light. Add the rhubarb and fold in.
- 4. Transfer the mix to the greased tin and bake for approximately 30 40 mins or until sponge is firm to the touch. Remove from the oven and allow the cake to cool slightly before removing from the tin. Sprinkle or dust the top of the cake with demerara or icing sugar.
- 5. Serve warm with custard, ice cream or cream or cold with a nice cup of tea.

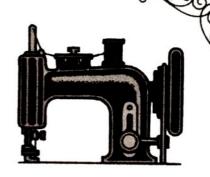
