
Due to the weather being so changeable and as we are only a small number, the Chapel will be closed until March. With the coming of spring our future will be more clear.

# A Changing Focus—from Jesus' birth to his death

It seems that only yesterday that it was Christmas. On the 2nd of this month we celebrate the Presentation of Christ at the Temple, which signals 40 days after the birth of Jesus. This is the time when Mary would have had to go to be ritually cleansed after the birth of Jesus. Jerusalem was only about half a day's walk from Bethlehem, and the Bible says this is where Mary and Joseph went to perform this ritual. It is not known exactly where this would have taken place, but the Pool of Siloam was not too distant from the Temple Mount in Jerusalem and it would be logical that women like Mary, coming to be ritually cleansed, would have gathered together in the pool, fed by running water coming from the spring of Gihon, to perform the ceremonies of cleansing.

From there Mary and Joseph would have climbed up to the Temple Mount and bought two Turtle doves or pigeons, as they were too poor to afford a lamb. These would then have been taken to the Priests to be sacrificed on the Great Altar. With this action they redeemed their first born son, as the first born sons of the Israelites were saved in Egypt, where the people of Israel were being held in slavery. The night of the Passover, the Israelites in Egypt at that time sacrificed a lamb, and marked their doors to show their sacrifice had been made. Moses was then able to lead God's people to freedom. Eventually they reached their Promised Land, the land of Israel, where they became a nation in their own right.



The Presentation didn't go quite as expected. Mary and Joseph were walking across the Court of the Women, in the Temple, when they were stopped by Simeon, a man who had been waiting a lifetime for a sign from God that the redemption of Israel was beginning. He took Baby Jesus from Mary's arms and began to croon over him. To his parents astonishment he said,

'Lord, now you let your servant depart in peace, according to your word. For my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of every people, to be a light to reveal you to the nations and the glory of your people Israel.'

If that were not strange enough, he was joined by Anna, who we are told was 84 at the time of her encounter with Jesus. She crooned over Jesus, as Simeon had done, then gave glory to God, and thanks for having lived long enough to see the redemption of Israel. Mary and Joseph must have had some idea by this point that God was not going to allow them to bring up his son incognito. There were people who somehow knew who and what Jesus was.

Ash Wednesday on 22nd February sees the beginning of Lent. As soon as people realise Lent is beginning, many make resolutions to give up chocolate or wine, something that they know is not good for them, and might even help them to lose weight or generally reduce their alcohol intake. Those who are more faith focussed might choose to give up something and do something extra during Lent.

Whatever you may choose to do, the object of the exercise is that in the depriving of something you desire, your thoughts and actions will be turned to focus on God. For forty days and forty nights (not counting Sundays which are considered feast days in their own right) we are given time to prepare for what we know will be the climax of the story of Jesus Christ; his death and resurrection. As during this month we change our focus from birth to death let us take the time given to us to meditate on what God wants from us at this coming season, that we might be prepared for Easter Sunday, the day of Jesus' Resurrection and our salvation.

# Christingle service shines light on child poverty

St Mary's Christingle Service took place on Sunday 8 January attracting a large congregation of all ages. The early new year Christingle service has become a tradition at St Mary's raising money for The Children's Society.

This year we were pleased to welcome Jess Meade. the society's communications officer for the West of England. In her short address Jess highlighted the plight of families in Britain today in which 4.3 million children live in poverty. That amounts to 3 in every 10 children and there has been a 107% increase in children seeking emergency food since The Children's Society campaigns for improvements but provides many services directly. A recent successful campaign has led to a capping on



the price of school uniforms, a measure that will come into effect shortly and is aimed at ensuring that low income families have to struggle less to be able to afford uniform.

Christingle services, which use an orange, a candle and sweets as symbols of God's love, provide an essential annual boost to the society's finances.

Some members of the congregation at St Mary's also contribute individually through home collection boxes (available from Jenny Harris -djacharris@hotmail.com) which can be filled with loose change through the year. The total raised from the Children's Society boxes for 2022 was £453.

# January rains force closure of Bath Road




Following December's cold snap, the new year began with a period of unusually heavy rainfall. As the A431 at Swineford flooded, South Gloucestershire Council closed the road and mounted a continuous patrol to stop cars trying their luck through the floodwater. The Swan became the final stop on the route that was open to traffic.

The closure placed added pressure on other routes, mostly the main A4 road through Saltford, but traffic also made greater use of both Marshfield and Golden Valley Lanes.

The lower of the roads, Golden Valley Lane, at times itself became a river as ditches and drains failed to deal with the deluge.

The only remaining bus service to the centre of Bitton, the No 19, was diverted through Keynsham, dropping travellers to Bitton at Cherry Gardens. Following five days of closure over the second weekend in January the road reopened as normal.

## **Bob Willis** 1934-2022




Bob in medieval outfit at the fete

If anyone saw the world in terms of a glass half full rather than half empty, it was Bob Willis. Bob had a natural tendency to look on the bright side of life.

Born in Hanham in 1934, Bob grew up above the shop that his grandparents had opened in the High Street. Originally a general store, Bob's father specialised as a newsagent and tobacconist.

After National Service in the RAF, Bob joined BAE and worked on aircraft for the remainder of his working life. In 1960, he married Ann and together they lived in a succession of houses in Hanham, Willsbridge and Bitton as well as for a short time in Bath

Bob enjoyed a lengthy retirement and it was one in which he and Ann gave great support to St Marys. Ann served as churchwarden for 6 years, supported by Bob who also took on a role as verger. They both loved St Mary's and worked together as a team to ensure that the church was run well, devising a number of fund raising activities and not least the impetus for the 2005 Son et Lumiere. Bob loved a good story and delighted in theie telling and re-telling most often with an added twist to extend the humour. He revelled in a sense of fun and wanted others to share his appreciation of life and events.



He was also not averse to a sense of drama and could be persuaded to dress up and play many parts. He was particularly keen to turn up in a medieval outfit for the annual fete. Having shown many people around St Mary's he volunteered for and obtained a role as a guide to Bath Abbey — an added benefit must have been the fact that the job required the wearing of a special outfit.

Bob was diagnosed with a degenerative form of dementia some years ago and eventually had to move into a care home. In spite of his illness Bob remained cheerful, pleased to welcome visitors and remained a man who had lots of stories to tell.

Bob died two days before new year. His funeral at St Mary's was very well attended and included an entertaining poem about Bob written by our former vicar, Paul Denyer.

# Voter ID IS COMING – MAKE SURE YOU CAN VOTE The Government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a

polling station at some elections and will apply at the local elections this May. In order to vote you will need to confirm your identity with the polling officers.

Not all forms of ID are acceptable, although the following will be:

- Passport
- Driving licence (including provisional licence)
- Blue badge
- Certain concessionary travel cards
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric Immigration document
- Defence identity card
- Certain national identity cards

You can find out more about which forms of photo ID will be accepted, by visiting electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID or calling their helpline on 0800 328 0280.

#### If you do not have an accepted form of photo ID

If you don't already have an accepted form of photo ID, or you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate. *Continued overleaf*

# Valentine Cake Pops



Serves: 20 Ingredients

800g Victoria Sponge mixture - made from cake using 200g Flour Buttercream icing -(stiff) made from 200g Icing Sugar 200g Candy Melts, pink 200g Candy Melts, white Pink and white Sugarpaste for decorations White and pink Sugar Sprinkles Cake Pop or Lollipop sticks

#### Method

- 1. Crumble the cake into a large mixing bowl, as finely as possible.
- 2. Begin to mix it with the buttercream icing a tablespoon at a time until you get a fudge-like consistency.
- 3. Cover the mixture and chill for at least 1 hour. When the mixture is firm but not hard it is ready to work with. Break off a small piece of the mixture, about the size of a ping pong ball and roll into a smooth ball. Refrigerate until firm, about 15 mins.
- 4. Melt the candy melts.
- 5. Take a pop stick and dip one end (2cms) into the candy.
- 6. Immediately and carefully stick the pop stick into the centre of the cake ball, about halfway through. Allow 1 to 2 mins for the candy to set.
- 7. Dip each ball of cake into the candy melt. Ensure you cover right to the top of the stick to secure the pop on the stick.
- 8. Dip in sugar sprinkles if you are using them and allow the candy to set, 1-2 mins.


