Mothering Sunday



When Jesus saw his mother there, and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to his mother, 'Dear woman, here is your son,' and to the disciple, 'Here is your mother.' (John 19: v26-27.)

This month, as we journey on towards Easter, we stop on the way at the fourth Sunday of Lent, a day that has traditionally become for us Mothering Sunday.

And I think it's fair to say that there has been a lot of re-imagining of Mothering Sunday down through the years. Like many Christian festivals, Mothering Sunday probably has its origins in some kind of pagan celebration, and it wasn't until after Constantine converted to Christianity that it became a Festival that honoured the Blessed Virgin Mary. Originally in this country, of course, Mothering Sunday was the day when servants in large stately homes were permitted to return to their mother church and to see their families, their mother church usually being the one in which they were baptised. For many it would be the only time in the year perhaps when they were able to see their family. Nowadays however, it has become very much a celebration of mothers, grandmothers and carers. Often known now as Mother's Day, it usually involves family get-togethers, flowers, chocolates and Sunday lunch!

But what has also evolved over the course of time are the roles of motherhood and caring, as women began to carry on working after children came along, men became much more involved in bringing up children, and the word "househusband" crept into the English language.



Just under 30 years ago, on March 12th. 1994, Barry Rogerson, the Bishop of Bristol ordained the Church of England's first thirty two women priests, one of whom was Margery Simpson, who went on to serve as a curate here in our Benefice. I wonder after that if it ever crossed our minds that somewhere, someone preaching a Mothering Sunday sermon might actually be a real mother! And we have to acknowledge too that in some families today of course the dynamic is completely different- there could well be two mothers, or two fathers instead of Mum & Dad.

But taking all that into account, it is possible today to see the much deeper significance of Mothering Sunday as part of our Lenten journey towards the momentous events of Easter. Mary, the mother of Jesus, appears twice in John's Gospel: first at the wedding in Cana and finally standing at the foot of the cross as Jesus fulfils his earthly mission. At Cana she demonstrated her complete faith in her son, telling the servants to do whatever he told them. And now here on the cross, Jesus, even in his extreme agony, sees his mother and acts as a loving, dutiful son, ensuring she will be looked after by entrusting her to the



care of the disciple whom he loved. His mother was to look on him as her son, and he was to look on her as his mother. Even at the worst-and most important-moment of his life his thought is for others. He knows that they are suffering too.

But this defining moment in human history also saw the creation of something incredibly beautiful and significant. As Jesus sees his mother and his disciple he joins them together, creating a new family with an unspoken command to love and care for each other as mother and son. We often see Pentecost as the birth of the church don't we, but perhaps it's really in the shadow of the cross that a new way of being family and community is born. As Phillip North says in 'Walking The Way Of The Cross', "Here, through the shedding of his blood, Jesus forms a new family of love, one that we call the church." And suddenly we are gathered into a family that has so much more than just a biological connection- we are connected through faith in Christ, and perhaps this gives a much deeper sense of what it really means to be the family of the church. We come to this family, not by birth but by baptism. We are blood relatives not through our blood, but through the blood that he shed so willingly for us at Calvary.

But we also have to acknowledge that families don't always work do they? And that for some Mothering Sunday can be difficult, challenging and painful for all sorts of reasons. And in acknowledging that, it is so very important that we hold on to the fact that whatever we are feeling, wherever we are in our lives, good or bad, God really does care and that it was precisely because he cared so much that Jesus went to the Cross.

So maybe through those two verses from John's Gospel we can see that Mothering Sunday has much deeper significance and meaning than we might think. As Mary at Calvary watches in horror and despair, somehow through the coming together of the pain of motherhood and the suffering of the cross we are learning new ways of being family, just as over the last two or three years we have learned new ways of being church.



So yes, it is right and proper today that we celebrate the love of our mothers and grandmothers, but it is also right that we celebrate too the love of everyone, be they relatives or friends, who perhaps have been like a mother to us, and to honour all those who care for us and for others, regardless of family ties, gender, age, race, culture or creed. As he hung there on the cross Jesus gathered together two people who loved him, and the words he spoke to his mother and to his disciple tell us in no uncertain terms that as the family of the church we have to honour his sacrifice by offering love and hospitality in in a way that recognises and welcomes every single human being as a unique and precious gift from God, whoever they are and wherever they are on their journey through this life.



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Pardon the Pew

Apologies to all those who were hoping to enjoy a pancake while trying out the new prototype pew on Shrove Tuesday.

Regrettably it became apparent that the new pew was not going to be ready in time for the event which was therefore postponed. A date will be set for a new event sometime before Easter.

The modified pew is one that was removed in 2017 and has been held in storage. These pews along with those remaining in the church will be modified and used to create a full set of 20 new pews that are mobile and can then be configured into different arrangements or moved away , as needed. The opportunity is also being taken to make the pews more

comfortable. It is this point, in particular, that the views of the community are being sought. Additional seating will be provided in the form of new stackable chairs, which will also be upholstered.

Seating in the church has been changed many times over the years with the last major reordering having taken place in 1967. The oak pews currently in use in the church date from the 1870s.

More information on a revised date for the event will be published soon.

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ECO Church News

Regular readers may recall that in January there was an article describing how to make bird boxes. I'm happy to report that two of the boxes Keith made are now installed in the churchyard, and we look forward to seeing if any of our resident birds consider them worthy of occupation!

It was a beautiful sunny February afternoon in Bitton, and the churchyard was filled with birdsong and signs of spring. We were closely watched the whole time by a perky little robin who was very tame and who seemed very interested in all we were doing. We also put up two bird feeders, one with energy balls and one with peanuts, which also greatly interested the robin! Do have a wander through the churchyard and see if you can spot the boxes and the new feeding station.

Eco church is about caring for God's creation in various ways, and encouraging native wildlife is a large part of this. We would also like to have a bee and insect hotel at some point, and keep an area of the churchyard for native wildflowers and plants that benefit birds, bees and butterflies. This is a work in progress, so watch this space! If anyone has any ideas or resources that would help with this I would love to hear from them.

General Synod - Blessing for same-sex couples take step forward

There has been much in the news about the General Synod's debate on blessings for same sex marriages and it has been a matter of considerable discussion and prayer in the church.

The official Church of England position has been set out by the two archbishops and the Bishop Of London, Sarah Mullally, recording that the General Synod has welcomed proposals which would enable same-sex couples to come to church after a civil marriage or civil partnership to give thanks, dedicate their relationship to God and receive God's blessing.

Synod members also voted to "lament and repent" of the failure of the Church to welcome LGBTQI+ people and for the harm that LGBTQI+ people have experienced – and continue to experience – in churches.

The Synod's comments will now guide the bishops as they prepare new pastoral guidance for the Church on sexuality and marriage in the coming months before the prayers are formally commended for use in churches.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, and the Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, said: "It has been a long road to get us to this point.

"For the first time, the Church of England will publicly, unreservedly and joyfully welcome same-sex couples in church. The Church continues to have deep differences on these questions which go to the heart of our human identity.

"As Archbishops, we are committed to respecting the conscience of those for whom this goes too far and to ensure that they have all the reassurances they need in order to maintain the unity of the Church as this conversation continues.

"We hope that today's thoughtful, prayerful debate marks a new beginning for the Church as we seek a way forward, listening to each other and most of all to God.

"Above all we continue to pray, as Jesus Himself prayed, for the unity of His church and that we would love one another."

The Bishop of London, Sarah Mullally, who led the debate and chairs the group which oversaw the development of the proposals, said: "This is a moment of hope for the Church.

"I know that what we have proposed as a way forward does not go nearly far enough for many but too far for others.

"It is my prayer that what has been agreed today will represent a step forward for all of us within the Church – including LGBTQI+ people – as we remain committed to walking together.

"We have always said we will listen carefully to Synod, so over the next few months we will reflect on everything which has been said and prepare new pastoral guidance for the Church on matters of sexuality and marriage. We will also refine the texts of Prayers of Love and Faith."

St Mary's has a long history of supporting the work of CMS. We support through financial giving and prayer. Our previous CMS Link was Dr Corrie Verduyn who worked as a gynaecologist in a rural hospital in Uganda. When Corrie retired we chose to support Katia Rocks and her family who live in Florianopolis, Brazil. Katia is also supported by St Barnabas Church, Warmley and when she recently visited the UK to visit her support churches, Katia was the guest speaker at a joint benefice service.

Katia works in a church in Florianopolis called Vineyard Floripa. She spoke about the history of the work she and others have done to establish and build up a church congregation with particular emphasis on outreach to support the local community. When Katia first went out to Brazil the church meeting was held in her house with a small group of people. Their main focus was on developing strong relationships with each other and God through Bible study and discipleship. This group of people grew, so in

2016 they moved to a small building, meeting weekly with a focus on families with young children. They also worked hard to reach out with the Christian message to children and young people living in the local Favela. The Church continued to grow and by 2018 they moved to an even bigger building to accommodate a regular weekly congregation of 80+ people. They launched a monthly meeting for women and their smaller home groups grew in number. They also started a youth group, visits to care homes for the elderly and marriage support groups where married couples received Bible teaching, pastoral support and prayer.

Then in 2020 Brazil was, like the rest of the world, engulfed in the global Covid pandemic. The Church Services were online and many of the Church's activities had to be suspended. The Church was able to help by distributing food parcels to those worst affected. Activities have now restarted with strong worship teams and street evangelism and prayer teams added to their work. They have also started to engage with homeless people on the street with distribution of food alongside prayer and telling the Christian message of hope.

For the future Katia told us that she feels God is calling her to become involved in Ministry in Women's Prisons. She will still be involved in the work of her church but in a reduced role so that she has time for prison ministry. She is already in touch with a man, Pastor Antonio, who has worked in prisons for a long time bringing the Gospel to those in great need.

Katia thanked us for our support for her work and asked us to continue to pray for her and her church. Her prayer requests are:-

Pray for new leaders for the Vineyard Floripa church

Pray for the developing work at the Women's Prison and the homeless on the street

Pray for Katia and her family (she has two children), for their physical and spiritual health and good schools



Apple Scones

Serves: 20 Ingredients

- 225g self-raising Flour
- 1 tsp Baking Powder
- pinch of Salt
- 50g Margarine
- 50g Granulated Sugar
- 1 medium-sized Cooking Apple, peeled, cored and chopped
- 150ml of Milk
- Glaze
- some Milk
- 25g Demerara Sugar

Method

- Heat the oven to 2000C mark 6.
- 2. Lightly grease a baking tray. Sieve the flour, baking powder and salt into a mixing bowl.
- 3. Rub in the margarine until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Stir in the sugar. Stir the apple into the mixture. Mix together, using a fork, with sufficient milk to give a soft, but not sticky, dough.
- 4. Knead lightly on a floured surface then roll out to a circle, about 20cm in diameter. Place on a lightly greased baking tray and mark into eight wedges. Brush the top with milk and sprinkle with demerara sugar.
- 5. Bake for 20-25 minutes until well risen, golden and firm to the touch. Place on a cooling rack.

Why not try this month's quiz on the London Underground? I have no doubt that Carolyn has placed one or two questions that means it is not quite as straightforward as it seems.

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
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
