

# Upton Cheyney Chapel to close in September

It has been announced that the URC chapel at Upton Cheyney will close in September. The last service in the chapel will be held on 10th September.

The news was announced with great sadness, but the chapel, which was reprieved from closure a decade ago does not have sufficient support to continue.

The chapel was built in the 1830s and was one of many non-conformist chapels



within the parish of Bitton that offered an alternative to the Anglican Church. A schoolroom was later constructed at the rear of the building, later replaced by the Upton Cheyney School. The chapel was very much a centre of life in Upton Cheyney and until the mid twentieth century had a sizeable congregation.

Although the chapel has proved to be a popular venue for weddings, and retains a small number of dedicated members, this is not enough to maintain the chapel and the United Reform Church has decided that it should close its doors for the last time. The future of the building is ,as yet, unknown.

# Are you sitting comfortably?

The answer to that question is probably a resounding "no" if you have had to sit on one of St Mary's benched pews for any length of time.

The pews, which date from the 1880s are unusual, being made of oak rather than the pine that was used very widely in churches during the same period. They also have individually carved ends each traditionally thought to have been designed by the Vicar, Henry Nicholson Ellacombe.

Although the pews give a "traditional" look to the church, they are a barrier to the more flexible use of the building as a community centre and limit the range of activities that can be held.

Now, after a lot of work a new pew has been designed that is both more comfortable and moveable. It has a wider seat and cushions on both the seat and the back. It means that the church will be able to be used in a more flexible way, but also retain its traditional form, with forward facing pews most of the time.



Some have already tried it—why don't you?

The walks are self-guided, allowing individuals to take their time and explore the area at their own pace. There are separate maps for Bitton, Oldland Common and Willsbridge.

Each walk comes with an easy-to -read illustrated map that guides

visitors through the historic sights of the area. The maps also include step-by-step directions, photos, and background information. Accessibility details are clearly indicated on each map.

#### **Recent Past**

The new audio guides include the story of the Millennium Patchwork and how it became a community project

#### **More Audio Guides**

For those wanting a less energetic experience, why not drop into St Mary's Church itself and take a mobile phone with you. That way you will be able to access up to 20 audio descriptions (10 new ones have been added) about treasured and often unusual objects from the church's past.

The oldest item is parts of a rood (a stone carving of Christ on the Cross) which dates back over a thousand years. Many of the objects have fascinating links to faraway places – to Switzerland, Verona, the battlefields of northern France; and even Maryland, in the United States.

Each description has been read by a team of local volunteers and is accompanied by a series of related pictures.

The church is open to visit every day for the rest of the summer.



#### Art of the Anglo-Saxons

The oldest item the guides cover is that of the stone rood, - a figure of Christ—that dominated the interior of the church a thousand years ago.





### News from Bitton WI

This month's slightly later than usual meeting began with the usual Welcome from our President, Jean and last months minutes read and agreed.

Our Secretary, Ros, gave us a flavour of the shortlisted Resolution our WI is supporting this year. Entitled "Clean Waters for People and Wildlife", it highlights the poor quality of water in our rivers and seas, due to pollution from sewerage and other contaminants regularly pumped into our waterways. The resolution asks WI groups to work with local authorities to stop such pollution and improve the water quality to enable safe bathing for people and the limit the harm to wildlife. We unanimously agreed to support this resolution.

Our WI summer trip this August is to see the SS Great Britain. Members are reminded to put their name down if they wish to go. If you aren't going to be at the next meeting, please email us on **bittonwi@gmail com** to add you name.

Our Speaker for this meeting was Clive Brain who gave us an interesting and illuminating talk about the M-Shed and the exhibits. Clive told us that before retirement, he worked as a Fireman both on land and on water on a boat called the Pyronaut. Clive would tell us more about the Pyronaut later in his talk.

He began by telling us about the M-Shed and why it was so called. Many of you will know that Bristol was a port city and had ships and boats coming right up into the centre of Bristol as far back as 1200s. The docks gave letters to each of the buildings within the dock and the M-Shed was just that – M Building.



He told us how in 1245 the river course was changed by putting in dams and creating a new cut called the Feeder Canal to allow water to remain in the docks when the tide went out. This had previously caused many problems as ships anchored in the docks would often list or fall over when the tide went out! The M -Shed still has 4 cranes alongside, 3 still work and one under restoration. This can be seen working most weekends and the public are allowed to climb into the cabs and have a go at moving one.

Clive told us of the many exhibits in the M-Shed and of some that are kept in-store in their original condition which the public were able to view also. Visitors to the M-shed can take a ride in one of their restored steam trains or a river tour in one of 3 boats which were in service on the river many years ago. The Mayflower, the John King and the Pyronaut are all still running today.

The Mayflower and the John King would tow the larger ships up through the River Avon from Avonmouth into the Bristol Dockyard. In fact, the last working job for the John King was to pull the SS Great Britain back into its' resting place in the Bristol Harbour.

Clive was the Coxen (Skipper) of the Pyronaut when it was in service and recalled how he worked on fires in Bristol as well as now working on the restored boat for M-Shed. The Pyronaut was involved in the Queen's Jubilee celebrations in Bristol and London. Trips around the harbour usually take place throughout the summer at the weekend.

Our next meeting will be held on Monday 12 June 2023, 2 pm, Church Hall, Church Road, Bitton. As always all welcome. Our speaker will be talking to us on "Maya to Mini Eggs". (I'm hoping there will be samples to try!). Any questions or enquiries, do contact us by emailing bittonwi@gmail.com.
