Whilst our weather has been mixed with our late "Indian Summer" bringing more warmth as well as some heavy rain, we now seem to be settling into a more traditional pattern so the Church heating is now back in operation. Pete Midgely led a splendid Harvest Festival Service with a selection of well-known hymns that filled the church with song – quite glorious. A perfect complement to the vibrant Harvest decoration in the church. With thanks to all those that made this happen.

Our attention will then turn to our annual Act of Remembrance for those lost in conflict. This will be particularly poignant this year as we seem to be bombarded by bad news not only from Ukraine but also now from Palestine.

The car capable of well over 100mph has to travel at a far lower speed; the bicycle on the cycle path encounters walkers and dogs that aren't thinking like a cyclist on a time trial. Perhaps we also need a little restraint and perhaps some empathy? Just imagine that impediment to your urgent progress is a close friend or family member. It works for me. # Ken Gibson - Lay Minister's Letter

# THE SEASON OF REMEMBRANCE

If I say to you 'November' what springs to your mind? My immediate thought is 'Remembrance'. The Poppy Appeal, the Albert Hall Festival of Remembrance and Remembrance Sunday are all part of the month along with dropping temperatures and sombre skies.

11 November was chosen as the time to remember the Great War, the War to end all Wars, because it was the day on which the Armistice was signed and the guns fell silent. Remembrance Sunday falls on the nearest Sunday to that date so this year the services in Warmley, Bitton and Syston and across the country and the world will take place on 12 November. Sadly that first world war was not the last so we will also be remembering the Second World War and many conflicts since right down to the twenty-month old conflict in Ukraine and the war of terror in the Middle Fast.

But it was long before the Armistice that the beginning of November became a time of remembrance for the Christian Church. For more than 1500 years 1 November has been celebrated as All Saints Day and a time to remember not just the famous named saints of history but also every follower of Jesus who has died. In many churches around this time Services of Remembrance or Rosemary Services are held at which people gather to remember their departed loved ones and all are welcome at the service to be held at St Barnabas Warmley at 4.00pm on Sunday 4 November.

A quite different November remembrance occasion which we can hardly miss are the fireworks surrounding 5 November.

The greatest tribute we can pay to those we remember, whether departed families and friends or those who died in battle, is to resolve to live our lives from hereon in the service of others. And in doing this we fulfil Jesus' teaching 'to love one another as I have loved you'.

I pray that this season of remembrance will be full of meaning for us all.



"There's Rosemary, that's for remembrance. Pray love, remember" says Ophelia in Shakespeare's Hamlet, as she wanders half mad and mourning her father's death.

What is it about this common herb that links it so significantly to acts of remembrance?



The association of rosemary with remembrance and with funerals long predates Shakespeare. Its pungent aroma meant that it was frequently used in the management of the dead. A mediterranean herb that is hardy even in northern Europe, it could not fail to excite interest, although its association was not always with death. It is and was a common component in bridal bouquets.

Its Christian connections are also explicit, the plant having supposedly gained its name and the blue colouring of its flowers from the Virgin Mary herself who is said to have thrown her cloak on the plant whose formerly white flowers were turned blue in her honour

In medieval times the plant was thought to repel evil spirits and cure thievery those concerned with prison overcrowding should perhaps take note.

Sir Thomas Moore marvelled at it running around his garden in Chelsea without intervention form gardeners because *"it is a herb sacred to remembrance and therefore to friendship."* 

Yet there may be a more scientific reason why the herb is so closely associated with remembrance - it is possible that its aroma stimulates cognitive function and memory.

There is a rosemary plant in Bitton Churchyard, and it grows abundantly on the grave of Bitton's pre-eminent plantsman Canon Ellacombe (pictured opposite). Given its association with memories, perhaps there should be more..



# It's rubbish – but South Glos Council wants your views on it!

South Gloucestershire Council has launched a consultation on proposed changes to waste collection and is asking residents for their views on their proposals.

The council has been on a long journey in respect of waste recycling and services. Twenty years ago, almost nothing was recycled, and it was well behind on refuse services compared with other councils. Now it is one of the best.

Only a tiny proportion of waste from black bins (about 8%) goes to landfill. Other waste is sold for recycling or burned to provide energy.

A selective proportion of the rubbish we place in black bins is sorted. A significant proportion is still food waste, so there is a lesson to all of us to make sure we place waste food in the right bin. But approximately a quarter is made up of soft plastic – the food and retail packaging that the council currently does not recycle but wants to provide the service in the future. Providing a weekly recycling process for soft plastic should mean that there will be sufficient capacity in black bins to reduce collections so that general household waste is collected once in every three weeks rather than fortnightly as present.

A shorter than usual meeting of the PCC took place on  ${\bf 11}^{\rm th}$  September.

**Safeguarding-** All PCC members need to be DBS checked and some renewals are now taking place. Jacqui Harris is the Safeguarding co-ordinator. She reported that the Diocese of Bristol is intending to set up some further Safeguarding Training on a Saturday morning in the near future.

**Futures** - It was reported that the work to convert the pews was currently out to tender, and it was hoped to announce the outcome soon.

**Church Hall** - The church hall had received an award from the National Community Lottery Fund which had enabled a gas heater to be purchased and fitted. Decorations are also planned.

**Fete** - This had been the most successful ever and had record takings of over £13,000 with £11,148 profit. Thanks to all who helped.

**Parish Share -** The diocese had requested a sum of £41,090 as Parish Share for next year. This was agreed subject to further budgetary discussion and clarity over the position of the benefice administrator, which had been advertised but remained unfilled.

**Other matters -** The PCC had previously agreed in correspondence to the repairs to the south boundary wall and replacement platforms.

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# News from Bitton WI

Bitton WI group met on an unseasonably warm afternoon on 9 October. We were welcomed by our President, Jean. Following the normal business our Secretary, Ros, spoke on her recent attendance at the Avon Federation WI, AGM in September. They had discussed the ongoing reduction in finances due to lower membership figures. Unfortunately, as is typical across the country, costs are rising which means the funds need to stretch a lot further. Support for some WI events had meant them being cancelled and were probably a consequence of people trying to manage their finances through the cost of living crisis. We heard about the interesting speakers who were at the meeting from Southmead Hospital's fundraising charity and a BBC Radio Presenter now turned Celebrant. Another speaker from the RAC, I believe, spoke to the group about the over 60's driving. It will come as no surprise that the older drivers blame the young drivers for terrible driving and the younger ones, vice versa! He told how at the current time there are at least 300 drivers aged 100 and over who still hold a current driving license. The oldest being 107 years old!

Our Speakers today was Andrew Stowe and his colleague, Annie from East Bristol Auctions. We did things a little differently and asked Andy and Annie to value some items we had brought with us. A wide variety of our precious possessions were displayed for them to appraise and value - everything from a gold pocket watch to a plate once owned by W G Grace himself. It was interesting to hear some of the history of the items. One such was a gift tin which was given to soldiers at Christmas by Queen Mary in the first world war. These contained a Christmas card and a number of useful items, such as a lighter, cigarettes or a pen. Only the Christmas card remained in the tin we saw and was valued at £50 - £80. If the pen or lighter had been present, then the tin could be worth more. Andy and Annie told us that Mantel Clocks had gone out of fashion at the moment so only worth somewhere between £30 - £80 depending on condition and size. They are still collectable as they go on forever, but the prices have dropped considerably in the past 20 vears or so.

A discussion about ivory and rosewood revealed that it is now almost impossible to buy or sell as it is protected. To sell these, a licence must be obtained and is only issued under certain conditions. Ceramics are also falling in price unless they are something really special. A collectable was bought for £10 around 20 years ago, is now only worth £3 or £4! We were also warned about the many copies made of expensive watches. Some look better than the original so always do the necessary checks before purchasing one at a price too good to be true.

Jewellery still commands good prices. Gold and Silver are often bought and sold by weight and carat though special pieces made by good makers will always reach good prices at auction.

A particularly interesting piece which caught both our auctioneers' eye was a small silver duck. When opened it contained a silver egg. This in turn opened out to be two egg cups. The legs of the duck could be removed and became small spoon to eat the eggs. Very ingenious and not something Andy or Annie had seen before. They agreed it could reach as much as £120 or more at auction.

All in all, a very interesting session. Some members were amazed and astounded to hear the present value of their treasured items, whilst a few of us were disappointed that we wouldn't be booking that cruise any time soon!

Our next meeting on Monday 13th November 2023 will include our AGM where we will be electing our Committee and a new President. We will also be enjoying Chair Zumba with Philomena Connelly.

# Pear & **Red Cabbage** Salad



# Ingredients

### For the dressing:

80g (30z) honey 60ml (4 tbsp.) cold water 45ml (3 tbsp.) red wine vinegar 1 red onion, peeled and sliced 60ml (4 tbsp.) olive oil Salt and pepper

### For the salad:

225g (8oz) red cabbage, finely sliced thinly 2 sticks of celery, sliced thinly 3 pears, Comice or Rocha, quartered, cored and sliced

## Method

### To make the dressing:

Put the honey and water into a saucepan, melt on a gentle heat and then use a fast heat to boil without stirring until deep golden. Take off heat and cool for 5 minutes.

Add the red wine vinegar then return to low heat and stir until smooth. Cool then whisk in the oil and seasoning.

### To make the salad:

In a large bowl, mix the cabbage, onion, celery and pears with the dressing. Toss together until well coated.
