I'm reminded by a certain *"holidays are coming"* advert (that I'm sure has now given you all an earworm, and I apologise), the 'holy days' are indeed almost upon us. We are now in the time of Advent, when I'm sure in houses throughout the land there will be excited opening of Advent calendars, whether that's a simple chocolate one to a more exclusive cheese, gin or perfume one.

Advent is a time of waiting; of anticipation; counting down the days until Christmas; and, of course, a time of preparation. Preparation for the big day itself, with food to buy and presents to wrap, a house to decorate, and parties to go to. Are you super organised and ready already; or like me will it all happen in that last week in a mad frantic rush?

It can also be a time of preparation spiritually and perhaps emotionally, as for some, this Christmas period is a time of joy and for others it is a time of more complex emotions, with sadness and worry being part of the mix, especially if there has been a recent bereavement or where financial constraints are an issue.

It might be in a simple smile, or a "Hello" as you pass some one on the street. You may be in a position to offer some time to volunteer at a local charity, or to donate something. Tea and cakes were available in the interval and there was a retiring collection in aid of church funds which raised £515.

This year, Christian Aid takes inspiration from the shining star and focuses a spotlight on Bangladesh, one of the poorest and most disaster-prone regions of the world, where they are giving women a time to shine. With the help of Christian Aid's local partner organisation, the women of Kurigram in Northern Bangladesh have set up a business selling their craftwork. They have been provided with Wi-Fi and learnt how to use social media to sell their goods. These women have become a guiding light in their community – leading the way out of poverty.

## *Jacqui Harris'* Carrot & Butternut Squash Soup

This is the recipe for the soup we had at the Autumn Fayre in October at St. Mary's. You can adjust just about any of the ingredients according to your taste..

## Ingredients( Serves 4):

4 good sized carrots.
1 small butternut squash
2 medium parsnips
1 medium onion
50g (2oz) butter
2 tblsp Olive oil (or rapeseed or vegetable oil)
2 tablespoons Marigold (Vegan) Bouillon vegetable stock powder. Or any preferred stock cube/stock powder.
2 pints water
Salt and pepper to taste
1 teaspoon Chilli flakes or paprika.

## Method:

- 1. Chop vegetables into chunks and place in heavy saucepan with butter and oil. Sweat the vegetables, stirring initially to get moisture through the veg then place lid on pan and keep on low heat for about twenty minutes or until the veg are soft.
- 2. Season the veg mix with salt, pepper and chilli flakes (or paprika) to taste. Cook for a couple more minutes to get the flavour in.
- Add 2 pints of stock either directly, or add stock powder/ cubes, then add water. (You can use chicken stock if you prefer).
- 4. Stir the vegetables & stock together and simmer for about ten minutes or so.
- 5. Blend the soup until it is smooth. Add hot water if it's a bit too thick.

Serve with crusty bread or on its own......Enjoy!

# **Bristol Slavery**



Slavery has been with us always and has been an endemic part of many cultures the world over. That was the message of Gary Best in a fascinating and well attended meeting of the Bitton History Group. His talk was entitled slavery in Bristol, and he described how the trade had grown in the city once the monopoly of the Royal Africa Company was removed from London. What was created was a triangular trade in which three profits were made: in selling manufactured goods to traders on the west coast of Africa, the buying of slaves and their sale for profit in the Americas; and a third profit from the importation of sugar, tobacco and cotton into England.

It was clear that Gary felt that Edward Colston has had something of an unfair press in recent years, compared to many other Bristol families who made profits from slaverv and endowed the city with many of its beautiful houses including much of Clifton itself. Colston's family certainly did make money form the trade although most of his money came from entirely different sources. The problem was that the Victorians put up a statue to his memory and his "virtue". Had the city council agreed to change the plaque, the statue might still be in place.





The most compelling aspect of talk concerned attitudes and not least those of the church. Slavery was not legal in England although there are plenty of instances of black people being engaged as servants or exotic attendants, but there was little concern about its use abroad For many years, the church took the view that as slavery was mentioned in the Bible it was acceptable; it was only later that the horrors of the trade were identified and campaigns took place to end both the trade and the ownership of slaves; in the later instance by a huge payment by the British government to slave owners made in compensation.. One man who gained his liberty and wrote a book about his life was Olaudah Equiano (pictured above) also did much to change attitudes. He also started the practice of a book tour as he travelled around the country, not only to publicise his book, but to prove himself as the author.

Slavery is still with us. It may not be lawful but it is estimated that there were 17,000 victims of modern slavery in the UK in 2022. The actual figure may be much higher.

## **Poles Apart?**



The cover photograph on this month's Focal Point is of Bethlehem, not the quaint little town of the Christmas carol, but as it is today.

Bethlehem itself is in disputed territory on the west bank of the Jordan. It is also less than 50 miles from Gaza and from the scenes of daily horror that have been the focus of the western world's media since early October. What, one wonders would be the message of the Prince of Peace to today's events?

One of the aspects of the almost constant news coverage has been the pressure by those representing both the Israeli Government and Palestinians in Gaza to expect the world to take their side. Both have reasons to feel deeply wronged by what has happened in the past two months. The murder of young people at a music festival and kidnappings are repellent but will that wrong be put right by the invasion of Gaza or even the annihilation of Hamas (if that is even possible)?

This pressure to distinctly on one side or another is unfortunately not confined to the conflicts of the Middle East. Frequently, extreme ideas and positions seem to become mainstream, and criticising seems to be taken as evidence of that individuals support of the opposite extreme opinion; which is often not the case. It is easier not to be critical and to adopt a public position of silence or indifference.

Of course there is no mystery as to what Christ's message would be – that we must love one another. Love itself has many aspects that include understanding, forgiveness and tolerance, seeing things from others point of view and showing an example. It is not easy and few of us achieve it – but do we have a better message; and, in the world of polarities, is love not the answer both to hate and to its more dangerous conspirator - indifference?
